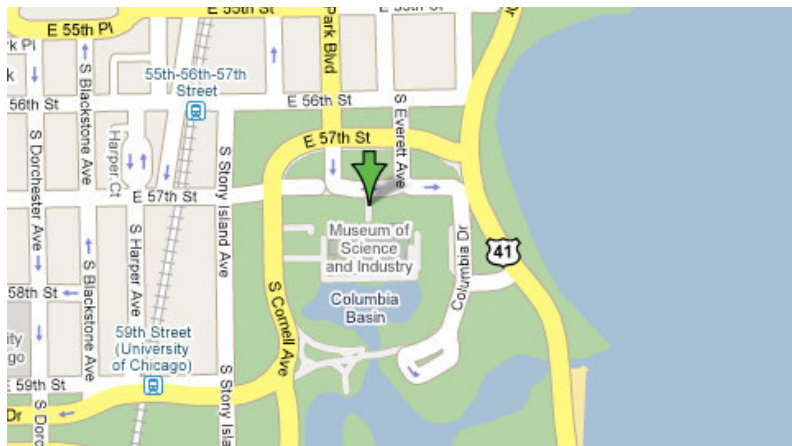


GETTING TO THE THEATRE



DRIVING DIRECTIONS

FROM THE NORTH: Head south on Lake Shore Drive and exit on 57th Street. In the left hand lane, follow the curve around to the west side of the building and South Cornell Avenue. Turn left to enter the underground garage.

FROM THE SOUTH: Take I-94 West to the 51st Street exit. Exit eastbound. Stay on 51st street for approximately one mile, turn right onto South Hyde Park Boulevard. Take South Hyde Park Boulevard south to 57th Street and turn right. Follow 57th Street around to the west side of the building, turn left at the first light and down the ramp to the underground garage.

FROM THE WEST: Follow 290 East or 55 North to Lake Shore Drive. Exit right on 57th Street. In the left hand lane, follow the curve around to the west side of the building and South Cornell Avenue. Turn left to enter the underground garage.

Parking is \$14 all day in the museum's underground garage. Enter at the northwest corner of the museum.

PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

BUS:

- #10 Museum of Science and Industry bus - stops right at the front door! Runs on week ends only. Catch it along the Magnificent Mile or on State Street between Wacker and Balbo.
- #6 Jackson Park Express - stops at 56th and Hyde Park Blvd. Walk one block south to the museum. Catch it on State Street between Wacker and Balbo.
- #2 Hyde Park Express - stops at 57th and Stony Island. Walk one block east. Runs only during morning and evening rush hours. Hop on at the Navy Pier bus depot or on State Street between Wacker and Balbo.
- #28 Stony Island Express - stops at 56th and Hyde Park Blvd. Runs on weekdays during morning and evening rush hours. Catch it heading east on Jackson between Canal and Michigan, or south on Michigan between Jackson and Balbo.

METRA: Trains to and from downtown Chicago stop at 55/56/57th Street Station. Turn left as you exit the station and walk two blocks south to the museum.

CTA: Take the Red or Green Line to Garfield and transfer to the 55 Garfield bus east-bound to the museum.

TICKETS

TO PURCHASE TICKETS: ONLINE - Visit: www.chicagochildrenstheatre.org/tickets.html
BY PHONE - Call the Chicago Children's Theatre Box Office at 866.811.4111 All major credit cards accepted.
WALK UP - Tickets will be available for purchase outside the theatre in the Museum of Science and Industry.

PRICES AND DISCOUNTS: \$18 - Children (2 to 12 years)
\$28 - Adults

Children under 2 are admitted free, but must sit on the lap of an adult with a purchased ticket for the entirety of the production.

Discounted rates are available to groups of 10 or more and can be purchased by calling GroupTix at 1.877.4.GRP.TIX

\$15 - Children (2 to 12 years)
\$20 - Adults

Admission to museum not included in purchase price; a museum ticket may be purchase in the great hall for a discounted rate.

SEEING A PLAY

A FEW THINGS TO REMEMBER WHEN BRINGING YOUR FAMILY TO THE THEATRE

- **LOOK FOR REVIEWS** - Plays will often have articles written about them in newspapers or magazines. CCT posts articles written about our productions on our website at www.chicagochildrenstheatre.org/in-the-news.html
- **DRESS CODE** - There is no dress code to see a play. Some patrons choose to make more of the experience by dressing up. Keep in mind that some theatres are warmer or cooler than others, so be prepared.
- **LATE ARRIVAL** - Being on time to a play is important, but if you are running late, don't worry! In most cases, the House Manager will find a good time to escort you to your seats even after the show has begun.
- **SHH!** - **QUIET PLEASE!!** - Just like at the movies, everyone should try to be quiet during the performance. Unlike a movie or tv, actors on stage can hear and see you. Remember to turn off cell phones and unwrap candy before the performance begins.

SOME HELPFUL TERMS TO KNOW

- **HOUSE MANAGER** - This is the person in charge of the ushers that help you find your seats. They are also the person to go to if you have a question or an emergency.
- **PREVIEWS** - Most theatres offer a week or two of "preview" performances before the official opening of the show. These performances are a great opportunity for the cast and director to fine-tune the production in front of an audience.
- **RUN TIME** - The length of the performance. The run time of your performance is approximately 50 minutes.
- **WILL CALL** - If you call ahead for your tickets, the theatre will hold them at the box office under your name so you won't have to worry about forgetting them.

MUSEUM EXHIBITS

Check out these great MSI exhibits, especially suitable for ages 2-6!

- **THE IDEA FACTORY** - Located on the Ground Floor.

This fully interactive exhibit provides children with endless opportunities for scientific exploration as they experiment with simple machines, light, color, magnetism, balance, air and water.

- **GENETICS AND THE BABY CHICK HATCHERY** - Located on the Main Floor. Don't miss the museum's most beloved exhibit! Watch as baby chicks peck their way out of their shells and take their first steps. Learn about DNA from a real strand of President Abraham Lincoln's hair and study your own hair up close.
- **TOYMAKER 3000** - Located on the Main Floor.

This exciting exhibit takes you through the entire process of creating a toy. Experience 8 interactive stations, 12 moving robots, and a 2,000 square foot assembly line that can produce 300 toy tops per hour! You'll also meet Max and Lisa, worker robots that can build models, write messages and race against you to complete a drawing.

- **THE SWISS JOLLY BALL** - Located on the Ground Floor, Lower Court.

One of the museum's hidden gems! Standing over 7 feet tall, 15 feet wide and 5 feet deep, this intricate classic pinball machine was named the Largest "Flipper" Machine in the World by the Guinness Book of World Records in 1988.

RESTAURANTS

Grab a snack or have a meal at one of the museum's convenient eateries!

- **THE BRAIN FOOD CAFÉ** - Located on the Ground Floor.

Hours: Mon-Sat: 9:30am - 3:30pm, Sun 11am - 5pm.

Features Starbucks coffee and other specialty drinks, pastries, continental breakfast, and a small selection of sandwiches and salads.

- **THE BRAIN FOOD COURT** - Located on the Ground Floor.

Hours: Mon-Sat: 9:30am - 2:30pm, Sun 11am - 2:30pm.

Features fresh-tossed salads, stir-fry, grilled items, pizza, and deli sandwiches.

- **FINNIGAN'S ICE CREAM PARLOR** - Located on the Main Floor.

Hours: Open daily at 11:30am, closes one hour prior to museum closing.

This old-fashioned ice cream parlor is based on a real Hyde Park ice cream parlor of the same name, which opened in 1917.

Features ice cream favorites, including sundaes and shakes. Also serves Starbucks coffee.

- **VENDING MACHINES** - Offering a variety of drinks and snacks, located on the ground floor near the group entrance and the lower court near the escalators.
